PRESIDENTS REPORT

Dear fellow gunners

2012 has been a significant year for the Association as it moved to re-establish its relevance for both past and serving gunners. The details are included in my report to the AGM on 10 November (later in this newsletter) so suffice to say at this point that it is just the start, and the committee of 2013 will work to build on this foundation work. Our four aims for next year will be to 1) reconnect with the WW2 and K Force gunners, 2) maintain our relevance to the Vietnam era gunners, 3) establish contact with the forty years worth of gunners since Vietnam, 4) establish relevance for the serving gunners.



3. REPORT FROM COL COMDT

I thought it opportune to outline where we are at as a Corps in a number of areas where there have been changes in the last year or so, or where there is likely to be change in the future. This is to serve as a background for readers and to seek any comment or guidance you may wish to give me.

I have broken down the update into notes on the Regiment, the Band, the new Heritage Trust, the RNZA collection in the Kippenberger Library, the Association, the Website, the Professional Journal, trophy guns, and the 161 Battery rock.

16 Field Regiment

Given the changes in the Army, the Regiment is in good shape. Regular Force manning sits at about 230. The annual intake of officers is usually between four and six and there are around 50 new recruits scheduled for 2013.

The gun numbers are little different from those that we are all familiar with. I try to spend as much time as I can with each of the batteries as they go on exercise. Earlier in the year I had a couple of days as an ammunition number on one of the guns in Waiouru. The gunners are quick into action, proud of their abilities, and as jovial as ever, while retaining the ability to produce edible food under the most trying circumstances.

The Regiment gets plenty of ammunition for live firing both their guns and mortars. Quick fire plans that I have seen had 17 or 20 rounds fire for effect as part of a two or three target fire plan. A lot of work is put into infantry/artillery co-operation and there are usually six or so live firing exercises each year involving a company and a battery combined arms live firing.

The TF are in reasonable shape with the Auckland based 11/4 Bty now back in 16 Fd Regt with an identical establishment to the RF batteries, although none are manned to scale. 11/4 Bty has just returned to Auckland a couple of weeks ago from its first LSP in a number of years.

Regiment is also looking at establishing a TF gun troop covering Wellington and Linton.

You will be aware that contact was remade with the US Marine Corps earlier this year when about 20 USMC gunners joined the regiment for a few weeks, including a live firing field exercise. Coincidentally this was the same US Marine Regiment that worked with 16 Field Regiment about a month before the Battle of Kapyong and during the third battle of the Hook in Korea.

In the last few weeks the regiment has had a detachment away with a Canadian field regiment on the east coast of Canada, a command post team in Singapore on a divisional command post exercise, and they are working on an exchange back with the US Marine Corps in Hawaii next year. Plans are underway for some exchange work with the Australians once they have withdrawn from Afghanistan next year.

The current guns are about halfway through a full rebuild to take their life out to 2030. This will

satisfy Government's Defence White Paper which requires the ability to deploy a combined arms task group anywhere in the South Pacific, operating independently from our allies, if necessary.

The Band

You will be aware that the Band was disestablished at the end of July this year. With the blessing of Chief of Army, the RNZA has signed a Heads of Agreement with the Band which allows them to retain their uniforms, military embellishments, name and association with the Regiment in return for recompense from Defence when they are engaged on military activities. The Agreement was put in place on Saint Barbara's Day, 4 December 2012.

Of course this is not an ideal situation but with the present restraints was inevitable. The Band remains in good shape. They have good playing numbers, a younger group of bandsmen, and own their own building, instruments, and music library.

The relationship between Band and Regiment will have to be worked on by both parties, but with perseverance and goodwill I am sure we will continue to see the Band prosper as a gunner entity.

The RNZA Heritage Trust

We have formed a charitable trust to locate, record, own and manage all of what we used to call unit private property. This covers everything from Mess silver through to archival records and trophies. The major collection is held in the Regimental Museum at RHQ in Linton.

Apart from the Territorial Force 11/4 Battery in Auckland, all of the Regiment including the School is in Linton. Regimental property however remains quite well spread out throughout the country in various stores and messes.

We need to ensure that all this property remains owned by the RNZA regardless of what happens to RNZA units in the future.

Permanent trustees are those in the appointments of Colonel Commandant, Regimental Colonel of the RNZA, Commanding Officer 16 Field Regiment, RSM 16 Field Regiment, and the President of the RNZA Association.

The trust has a number of other Regular Force and retired gunners as trustees, who have an interest in heritage. The trust is under the chairmanship of Graham Birch. The trust's work is already underway.

The RNZA Collection

The collection of mostly reference and historical artillery books that was held by the Directorate was loaned to the National Army Museum when the Kippenberger Library was first being established. The collection is an extensive and valuable collection of books. The RNZA also had a large glass enclosed and rimu bookcase built to house the collection. The collection has been added to in the last few years by Artillery families such as the Burns, Roberts and Hassetts, and others.

The Museum and Kippenberger Library are now at the stage where most of the books in the Artillery Collection are surplus to their requirements as they have multiple copies of those particular books. In addition, with the Army Schools having been shifted away from Waiouru, and the pending move of the Officer Cadet School away from the camp, the Artillery Collection is rarely used.

We have agreed that the books the Museum wish to keep – 104 books, about 20% of the collection – will be donated by the RNZA to the library. As the bookcase is purpose-built for the site, that will also be donated, with an appropriate plaque attached.

The remaining 339 books will return to the Regimental Museum in Linton and be owned by the Heritage Trust.

The RNZA Association

The Association – what was the Old Comrades Association – has been very active under the leadership of the late Frank Hopkinson and now Tony McLeod. The aim is to work more closely with the Regiment in terms of supporting their activities as much as possible, and to engage the serving and younger gunner communities in the Association.

Membership of the Association is now open to anyone who has worn the RNZA badge for three months – the length of the current basic gunnery recruit course. The Association is closely involved in the Heritage Trust, relieving the CO and his team from management of the unit private property and providing a curator for the Regimental Museum.

The Association has also initiated a mentors' program where each newly commissioned young officer will be assigned an experienced and retired officer as a mentor for any matters the young officer wishes to initiate. The latest crop of three young officers are in the process of meeting their mentors now. We want to extend this to newly promoted senior NCOs as well.

The Association is also looking at some form of resettlement assistance for soldiers, NCOs and officers transitioning out of the Army.

There are a range of other activities between the Regiment and the Association which will continue to develop a closer relationship. They are also building stronger links with the likes of KVA and the Artillery Officers Club, and local WWII gunner groups.

The Association Website

The Association has just launched a new website. You can get there at: www.rnzaa.org.nz . The website will be the central focus and communication tool for gunners in New Zealand. It will include the content of Gus Rivers' website so the historical content is not lost.

There is quite a bit more work to do on the website, mostly developing content around current and proposed activities, and the history records. The Association team is managing the development of this.

If you are computer savvy, you should also

have a look at the Association Facebook page which has around 250 active members – a few more active than the rest. This is where the current news and stories are held and where photos are captioned and pictures identified. You should be able to get to the site by doing a search for Royal New Zealand Artillery Association in the Facebook search menu, or by going direct to: www.facebook.com/#!/groups/RNZAA/.

Professional Journal

As part of the website, we have launched a Professional Journal for gunners. We have started with two articles: the first looking at the strategic position in the South Pacific for the next 15 to 20 years, and concentrating on the relationship between China and the United States; and, the second on The Defence White Paper and the Defence Capability Plan, and where the artillery might fit into that over the next 20 or so years. The third paper should be up on the site in the next couple of weeks, together with a paper discussing the future of Artillery in the Australian Army.

You can get to the Professional Journal from the appropriate menu on the Association website.

It may be that we will need to separate the Professional Journal away from the website so that it is stand-alone and more easily accessible on the Internet - time will tell as we measure its readership.

The aim of the Journal is to develop arguments that will ensure reasoned and widely accepted views on the continued employment of artillery and other RNZA capabilities into the future.

Trophy Guns

With the demise of the Directorate and the shift of all support activities to Defence, the "ownership" of trophy guns shifted to a staffer in Defence HQ. Additionally, the DRNZA records of where these guns were located have been lost.

Defence have been allocating guns based on a list of requests they hold, on an first in basis. This meant for instance that the L5 held by the now defunct New Plymouth RSA was to be allocated to another town which happened to have asked for a gun before anyone else, rather than staying in New Plymouth under the care of the Council, which is the wish of the RNZA.

We have been able to re-establish at least some influence with Defence over where these guns go, based on them being our colours and that some of the guns (M2A2s for instance) are still subject to end-user certificates. Defence will now seek endorsement of each allocation from the Regimental Colonel RNZA.

The 161 Battery Rock

In Tiny Hill's day as BSM he had the 161 Battery insignia and gunner badge painted on a rather large rock near the entrance to the Battery position at Nui Dat. This rock is still there and with faint red, blue and gold paint marks still on it. A project was initiated looking at bringing the rock back to the 161

Battery lines in Linton as a memorial.

We now have a sponsor who will recover the



rock, put it in a shipping container, and get it back to New Zealand. There is another sponsor who will fund a suitable bronze plaque. It now remains to get the permission of the Vietnamese government to bring the rock back to New Zealand. I am about to initiate work with MFAT to make suitable connections at government to government level to get the required permissions.

This will take some time. However, I think it would be a suitable centrepiece for the next 161 Battery Vietnam reunion in Linton on the 50th Anniversary of the initial deployment, some time in mid-2015.

Funding

Times have not changed. The major issue facing us is funding those activities that are not directly funded by Defence. This covers a whole range of things from silver grenades, through presentations, to funding for the development of the Heritage Trust, and, not least the Band. While the RNZA Corps Fund still has about \$25,000 in it, funding from the Central Welfare Fund ceased a long time ago.

We make up the annual operating costs of the RNZA Corps Fund by levying the Regular Force soldiers on a fortnightly basis from their pay. We are continually looking for better and fairer ways of funding.

One of the methods we could use is funding through Wills, and I seek your comments and views on this.

The idea would be for those gunners that wish to, to have a clause in their will allocating either a percentage of net assets or a fixed sum to a registered charity set up by the RNZA. The aim of the charity would be to provide welfare support to gunners and their immediate dependents where required, and funding for RNZA activities that enhance the traditions, education, and wellbeing of gunners and the Regiment as a whole – or words similar to that.

We currently have funds in trusts or charities with the 16 Field Regiment UPF, the RNZA Corps Fund, the RNZA Association, and the RNZA Band Association. These total nearly \$100,000.

Annual operating costs excluding the Band total about \$12,000. There is no scope with the present funding for any development, and at our

present expenditure capital funds will be rapidly extinguished.

We will need to reduce our activities across the wider group of gunners unless we raise more capital.

The NZSAS set up a similar trust fund a few years ago and it has been built into a significant element of the NZSAS ethos and culture. As I understand it, the fund is sufficiently large to provide fee assistance at tertiary level for the children of any soldier who has served in the SAS. The SAS fund is of course centred on welfare for needy SAS soldiers and their families, and for the funding of unit activities and presentations, but it has a sufficiently large capital base to provide its significant operational funding from earnings.

This would be a nice place for the RNZA to be.

End Of Mission-2012

Mike has been involved with the Association for many years, initially as Area Rep for the Bay of Plenty area, and then after moving to Auckland as Secretary/Treasurer and Vice President.

Mike was instrumental in setting up the blogspot MuzzleFlashes, and operated as the blog master for several years. He then set up the new RNZA Association website and has been its inaugural webmaster. Mike's contribution has been very significant in terms of establishing modern communication tools which will allow the Association to keep relevant going forwards, as well as providing a platform for the preservation of historical matters.

Mike was born and educated in Tasmania, moving to Patea in 1950. He joined the Territorial

Force (CMT) in 1953 and transferred to the Regular Force in 1956, as an instructor at CD Training Battery, Wajouru

In 1957 CMT ended and Mike, along with other instructors, were redundant. Due to a shortage of officers, he was commissioned in 1961 and posted to 16 Field Regiment. He served in 161 Battery for a time before moving to Regimental Survey Officer then G3 HQ NMD, where he was shown how to write; and then to the School of Artillery.

He completed his Army career with a tour to Vietnam in 1966, with Kenning's and Honour's batteries as Capt FO.

5. Treasurer's Report

12. WHAT ARE THE NORTH HEAD TUNNELS?

Ever wondered what is in the hidden tunnels in North Head? What happened to the original Boeing aeroplanes? What was the "Kaskowiski"? Who was "Ali Barber"?

This volcanic mountain (named Maungauika by Maori) is strategically positioned above the shipping channel which rounds it into the inner harbour. North Head is a natural lookout and defensive position for the harbour, and has been used for this purpose for centuries. Many fortifications were built. The old gun emplacements and underground connecting tunnels have been restored and now you can explore with a guide - bring a torch!

The Auckland Coastal Defences Historical Trust are registered with DOC to conduct guided walking tours and have access to areas that are normally closed to the public.

Some of the highlights include:

- The location and history of Gun emplacements from 1870s to 1950s.
- The Russian scare and "Kaskowiski" and the missing "Boeings"
- · Actual guns including the 8-inch BLHP "disappearing gun" and saluting battery.
- · Supporting magazines, Observation Posts, engineering, searchlight positions, stores, offices and accommodation.
- · And lots of dark, mysterious and historic tunnels!!

13. TWIN TRIBUTE TO JAPANESE VICTIMS

Twin memorials on opposite sides of the world will pay tribute to Japanese victims of last year's February 22 earth-quake. Christchurch man David Bolam-Smith commissioned local artist Annabel Menzies-Joyce to create a kahikatea memorial sculpture, paid for by Japanese donations, for the quake's first anniversary.

The sculpture was unveiled on February 22 at the Christ's College chapel. Bolam-Smith was inspired to commission a "twin" for Toyama City, where most of the Japanese victims were students, which will be unveiled next month. The ideas was conceived by New Zealand's ambassador to Japan, Ian Kennedy, at a fundraising event in Tokyo, Bolam-Smith said. "[Kennedy] was asking me if there was a memorial made for the fist anniversary and I said, 'No'. He said it was a shame because there was 80 parents coming form Japan, and I said, 'Lets make one'."

The reception the sculptures had received was "overwhelming", he said. Menzies-Joyce spent about six months on the two pieces. Kahikatea was symbolic because the tress grew together and gained strength from their roots, she said. "It was really good to do something that had meaning. I put a lot of myself into this. There was a lot of nights of no sleep ... and I'm really please with the way it's come together."

Bolam-Smith, who has a Japanese wife and has been a volunteer on the Christchurch and Kurashiki sister-city committee for more then 20 years will attend the Toyama City unveiling on June 25. The original

sculpture is not no display, but is expected to be installed on the "cardboard cathedral" site, on Madras and Hereford streets.

15. THE LIFE AND DEATH OF AN ARTILLERYMAN Lt Ralph D DOUGHTY MC – Part 3 The Illness/Injuries Sustained and Loss of Ralph D Doughty

Along with so many other serviceman at Gallipoli (and elsewhere) Ralph suffered from Pyrexia (severe fever). Son on the 27 July 1915 he was evacuated back to a hospital ship and from there onto Lemnos to recover. He returned to duty, although not back to 100% health on the 5th

August 1915 when he was landed back on 'W' beach in the early hours of the morning and was then into action later the same evening.

Ralph then received an injury after he was wounded in action at Flers, France on the 18th November 1916 when a shell explosion buried him and he sustained a concussion blast in the head and an injury to his shoulder and had to be admitted to the 38th Casualty Clearing Station before being transferred to the Ambulance Train No 26 on the 19th November 1916. He was then admitted to No 8 General Hospital, Rouen where it was found he was suffering from Trench Feet, which is an infection of the feet caused by cold, wet and unsanitary conditions.

From there he was transferred back to England on the 21st November 1916, for recuperation. After recovering from his injuries Ralph was discharged to No1 Command Depot, Perham Downs on the 27 the December 1916 and was marched out to the Reserve Brigade, Australian Artillery at Heytesbury on the 21st January 1917 and preceded back overseas to France on the 31st January 1917 to rejoin the 9th Battery, 3rd Field Artillery Brigade on the 9th February 1917.

Ralph was to then receive his Military Cross for his service to the King after an action at HERMIES on 9th April 1917.

On the 23rd July 1917 Ralph was again wounded in action at Passchendaele, Belgium, when he sustained a gunshot wound to the abdomen while "in action' and was admitted to the 91st Field Ambulance Station. But this time lady luck was not with him and he did not recover from his wounds, making the ultimate sacrifice for this country far, far away when he died of his wounds two days later on 25th July 1917 at the age of 26.

Ralph D. Doughty was laid to rest at Coxyde Military Cemetery, Plot I, Row F, Grave No 20, Belgium.

A whole generation of brave young men lost their lives when one 19 year old assassin from Slavic, fired two bullets. This occurred on the 28th June 1914 in Sarajevo, with the assassination of Archduke Franz Ferdinand heir to the throne of the Austro-Hungarian Empire, along with his Sophie. This was the catalyst which then led to the outbreak of World War 1 and went on to cost 15 million lives, with my great, great uncle being one of them. R.I.P.




