CAPTAIN JOHN FOOTE 100 YEARS

A good number of officers attended a Lunch at the Northern Club to celebrate the 100th birthday of one of their long-standing members, Captain John Foote. As Colonel Command I was honoured to present two medals to him for his service as an artillery officer in WW2.

John joined 3 Fd Regt as a 17 year old TF gunner and was called to full time service in Dec 1941. He was commissioned and saw his first action with 38th Field Regiment (3rd NZ Division) in the amphibious landing in the Treasury Islands in Oct 1943. When 3NZ Division was disbanded John was posted to 2nd NZ Div for the closing stages of the Italian campaign. Following this he served with the occupying forces in Japan until Sep 1946. His 5 years of Army service were followed by a very active civilian life involving leadership roles in charitable trusts, the Auckland officers Club, as well as giving time to his considerable musical, botanical, and sporting interests. embers of the Auckland Officers Club paid fine tributes to John.

The president of the club, Wing Commander (Retired) Keith Graham and our own Barry Dryer portrayed the man who was a dedicated gunner, loving husband and father, and a community leader.

John was presented with two medals; the Operational Service Metal (OSM) and the Defence Service Metal (DSM). His son Roger received the medals as John watched from his care home and was able to take part via skype.

OUR HISTORY

Awaiting the German Offensive the Winter of 1917/18

The majority of New Zealand Divisional Artillery remained in support of the Canadian offensive on Passchendaele until 1 Nov 1917 at which time the Canadian gunners took over the guns in place and the two NZ artillery brigades and Divisional ammunition Column retired for a much needed rest and recovery.

It should be noted that the 2nd NZ Artillery Brigade remained deployed on the Belgium coast where they had replaced French gunners. After an absence of 5 months they rejoined the Divisional Artillery as it moved to support the NZ Division in the first week of December.

The NZ Division returned to the line in Ypes in Nov but without NZ gunners. Brigadier Johnston and his CRA staff took command of an Australian and two British field Brigades which supported the NZ infantry until the NZ gunners took over the guns in early December. Prior to this NZ gunners had received new trench mortars. The six inch Stokes-Newton Medium Trench Mortar pictured below. These mortars were used for the first time supporting an unsuccessful NZ attack on Polderhoek Chateau

NZ gunners setting up their new mortars figuring out which bits go where. Note the absence of traverse/elevation gears and dial sights. Adjustments must have been made by turnbuckles on the stays. Range was 1950 yards and max rate of fire was 8 bombs per minute.



The gun positions were sighted in ground that had been well fought over and much work was required to bring them into a fit state with digging often uncovering bodies.

Command posts were established in the formidable German concrete bunkers with the entrance unfortunately facing German counter bty fire leading to the occasional round finding its way into the Command Post.

Despite the conditions and the normal exchange of counter bty fire the gunners found time to join the divisional rugby competitions and even enjoyed the comfort of a YMCA recreation hall specifically for gunners.

During this time it was necessary to adopt a defensive stance, as German forces were building up with troops and guns released from the Russian front. It was a matter of where and when they would attack.

The Germans could not delay their offensive in light of American forces building in both number and experience. British forces also required time to recover from the intense fighting of the previous months.

A significant German attack was expected and reserve and depth positions had to be constructed. Works relied very much on material salvaged from the area.

The guns fired only on SOS calls and counter preparation missions. When enemy divisions from the eastern front were detected in front of the NZ Division a creeping barrages of forty minutes was fired upon them to increase their displeasure of having to serve on the Western front.

By this stage it was necessary to deploy some 18 pdr guns as anti tank guns. 13 pdr guns were normally used for this role but they were insufficient in number.

On 21st March 1918 the long expected German offensive was launched to the South on a wide front and with tremendous force aimed at Amiens. The NZ Division and artillery received warning orders to move on 22 March. - Col Cmdt

9.2inch Gun Recovered

From The Fortress Study Group - A charity devoted to the study and preservation of fortifications in the age of artillery (roughly from 1500 A.D).

On 15 February the recovery stage of the restoration of Lelant Battery 9.2 inch gun and its rare Mark V Mounting was completed with the recovery of the barrel in a day-long operation. Operation Ubique has been doing a superlative job up and down the country, but there is little record of where all the old guns are and even less of the service record of these guns.

At the moment, we are concentrating on the 24 known former RNZA L5s, but rest assured that the 5.5s and the M101A1s will come under scrutiny as well

Grant Hays who works at the National Army Museum at Waioru, has done a magnificent job of tabulating the whereabouts of the known L5s and there has been a group beavering away for the last three months, tracking down where our L5s have got to.

The list of guns is in the table. We need your help to verify them all.

Identifying an L5 - Parts to photograph

There are two numbers we are interested in:


- The manufacture number a five digit 013xx series numbers running in sequence, 01301 to 01324
- The other is the MLA Number a five digit 571xx series number. The "LA" part of the number is in superscript see the examples below.

I spent 26 years in the RNZA, so I am ashamed to admit that I had no idea where to look for the significant numbers on an L5. For those who are as ignorant as I was, there is a guide below.

We need people who have access to an L5, either outside their RSA, City Memorial or otherwise, to record the number and take photographs of the numbers you can find.

We need the Gun Number and the MLA Number as stamped on the places indicated.

Don't be surprised if the number has been ground off the data plate number, or the Breech Ring number differs from the breech block, slipper, or muzzle brake number – there were some funny things happening. – John McNicol

SAINT BARBARA'S DAY IN SOUTH KOREA

St Barbara's Day celebrations were planned to have been spread over two weeks here in South Korea. The Fires Brigade based in Camp Casey (North of Seoul, close to the DMZ), had a unit pers only Ball on the day.

To that end I celebrated with my wife Mere, by having a shot of Cannon Blast rum with my coffee. We then drove from Camp Humphreys (South of Seoul) with our Aussie friends (he is RAN, but everyone needs a special friend) to Camp Bonifas (in the north on the edge of the DMZ). We were part of a group for Joint Support Area (JSA) tour rehearsals by the JSA Security Battalion. The Battalion are responsible for providing security for all tour groups to the JSA and needed a group to act as the rehearsal party. Tour bus took us from Camp Bonifas forward in to the DMZ and the JSA.

The tour goes past the bridge of no return which was used to transfer POW's after signing of Armistice. It was also the main route for the North Korean Army (KPA) to enter the JSA until the US blocked after the axe murder of Capt Arthur Bonifas by the KPA. This forced the KPA to build the 72 Hr Bridge to enable their access back to the JSA. We then moved on to Conference Row with the famous blue buildings.

The tour was allowed into the main conference building, this allows you to cross the border within the building into North Korea for 3-4 metres. After Conference Row the tour moves to the Blue Bridge, originally built to allow the Neutral Nations Supervisory Commission (NNSC) to walk directly from their camp to Conference Row for work.

In 2018 an addition was added to allow Presidents Moon and Kim Jong Un (KJU) to have a meeting in the middle. The bridge was also used for a meeting with KJU and Trump. From there you move back to Camp Bonifas.

On return to Camp Humphreys the day finished with an Aussie Xmas dinner attended by the Aussie/Kiwi contingents and invited guests. A good night during which we kiwis showed our american friends how to wander around in shorts and jandals in -3c weather during our transit from one drinking establishment to the next.



BRIGADIER RAY ANDREWS, CBE

ANDREWS, Raymond John 712609, Brigadier (Rtd), CBE. Malaya, BC 161 Bty Vietnam, Director RNZA, Commander Land Force Command, Colonel Commandant RNZA 1997–2003. Life Member RNZA Association. Passed away peacefully on 29 March 2022, aged 87 years.

It is with great sadness that we record the passing of Brigadier Ray Andrews, CBE. Brigadier Andrews served as the Colonel Commandant of the Regiment and was a Life Member of the Association.

Upon graduating from RMC, he became an Instructor RNZA at CMT Battery at Papakura, followed by a posting to RNZAF Flying School, Wigram to complete Air Observation Post training. He then returned to 16 Fd Regt at Papakura, which was reforming after its disbandment in South Korea.

1961 saw a posting to the British Army Flying Corps, flying operationally in Malaya, Brunei and Borneo. With Lt Chris Brown RNZA, they were the first of a number of RNZA pilots to be posted there.

Brigadier Andrews spent 1967 at Staff College, Queenscliff, Australia. A highlight of Brigadier Andrew's career was the year September 1969 -September 1970 he spent in Vietnam as BC 161 Battery.

After Vietnam in 1971 - 1973 he was posted to the 28th Commonwealth Brigade in Singapore as Brigade Major

During 1974-1976 he served as Chief of Staff of 3 Inf Bde Gp in Christchurch.

In 1977 he was appointed to Fiji as Chief of Staff of the Fiji Royal Military Forces for 2 years, during which time he oversaw the insertion of the first Battalion into Lebanon, where he stayed with the Battalion for 3 months to ensure they were operationally sound.

On return to New Zealand in 1979 he took up the post of Director of Royal New Zealand Artillery at Army General Staff. From there in 1981 he was appointed as the Commander 2 Task Force at Palmerston North.

In 1983 – 1984 he spent an interesting year long course, seconded to the Canadian Defence College. After another year, as Assistant Chief of Defence Staff (Personell), he was posted to Auckland as Commander Land Force Command. From there, 1987–1990 his final posting was as Defence Head, Liaison Staff, London.

Retirement saw Brigadier Andrews busy with a period as Colonel Commandant RNZA during 1997 – 2003. From 1990 he has had honorary appointments in Old Comrades, Artillery Officers Messes and the RNZA Band.

On 20 November, 2013 Brigadier Andrews was made a Life Member of the Royal New Zealand Artillery Association

In 1960 Brigadier Andrews married Laurie and they have three sons; Craig, Anthony and Hamish-all of whom have been gunners.
